years was a family home including the Ainsworth and the Radcliffe families and is now owned by Bolton Council.

We visited rooms such as Mrs Ainsworth's Drawing Room, the Library, the Great Hall and Chapel, pointing out various architectural elements and how each room would have been used. The chapel is still in use for occasional services by St Peter's C of E on Church Road in Smithills. Afterwards we all enjoyed drinks and cakes in the cafe.

Hymn Writers

The Hymn Writers page in this magazine is based on the research of Michael Bainbridge. To hear the full stories, why not attend our Classical Praise services at 6pm on the first Sunday of each month (see page 23) and you get to sing the hymns too!

Come ye thankful people, come by Henry Alford 1810 to 1871. Henry was educated at Trinity College, Cambridge. He was ordained in 1833 and served in various curacies and held several important appointments, including that of a Fellow of Trinity. His edition of the Greek Testament was the result of 20 years' labour.

wrote "Come, Ye Thankful People, Come" in 1844 while he was the rector of Aston Standford church in Buckinghamshire. It was first published in Hymns and Psalms in 1844. It was set to George J. Elvey's hymn tune St. George's, Windsor.

including one in Hymns Ancient and Modern. which led to Alford publishing a footnote stating his disapproval of these revisions that had heen made without his agreement.

Alford was а attempted to keep good relations Walmington-on-Sea platoon between non-conformists and the harvest service. High Church Anglicans in the Church of England: "Come, Ye Thankful People, Come" is commonly found in evangelical hymn books as Alford's "Forward be our watchword" "Ten thousand and times ten thousand".

The hymn later gained popularity



in the United States where it is used as part of Thanksgiving celebrations. The first verse is written as a celebration of the harvest, calling for people to give thanks to God for it. The last two verses are based on the In 1861 there had been a number of Parable of the Tares (weeds) and unofficial revisions of the hymn, discusses the last harvest at the Second Coming of Jesus.







Structure and Governance of the Methodist Church Part 2– The Circuit

The circuit is normally a group of churches served by a team of

ministers. A minister will have pastoral charge of one or more churches, but will preach and lead worship in different local churches in the circuit, along with local preachers. The arrangements for leading worship in a circuit are drawn up in a quarterly plan.



The circuit is led by the superintendent minister who

presides over the circuit staff (both lay and ordained) and the circuit meeting, and with lay and ordained colleagues facilitates and encourages mission throughout the circuit. He or she is also responsible for drawing up the plan and arranging the gathering of information about activities (e.g. baptisms, weddings, and funerals) and about membership statistics in the circuit.

Responsibility for the direction and policy for the circuit is shared between lay and ordained. Voluntary circuit stewards have responsibility for maintaining, buying and selling circuit property (usually manses), and for the general welfare of the ordained and employed staff in the circuit. There is also a circuit treasurer.

The circuit is the place where new initiatives and changes in the pattern of church life need to happen. This is where the staffing capacity, where closures of chapels are debated, and where fresh expressions of church or new pioneer ministries are launched.




